**Bergen County Closes in on Stigma Free Goal** 

Since Paramus Mayor, Rich LaBarbiera wasurged in 2012 by Stigma Free Zone Founder and Paramus resident, Mary Ann Uzzi, to "dosomething about mental illness" 44 of 70 Bergen towns have followed suit, pledging to join the Stigma Free Zone educational initiative and pass town resolutionsto educate locally about mental health.

The goal is to have every Bergen municipality declare themselves a Stigma Free Zone to fight the stigma of mental illness. Creatinglocal mental health outreach and programs through diverse volunteers is howthe movement has gained momentum and attention statewide.

The Hoboken NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) created the concept, but Uzzi gave it powerful wings. She says the success of the Paramus SFZ is due to the buy-in and support of county and town officials. In Paramus, the school system, library, police and health department are just a of the few local groups lending manpower and funding to their SFZ. Uzzi boughtthe SFZ idea to her neighbor, Bergen County executive, Jim Tedesco, who got the County Freeholders involved. The idea just took off all over Bergen County.

Assemblyman Dr. Tim Eustace pushed the SFZmovement beyond Bergen County borders when he wrote and supported NJ AssemblyResolution AR236, which encouraged every NJ municipality in the state to pass a Stigma Free Zone resolution. It passed in October, 2015. Since then, Passaic, Hunterdon and Morris Counties have all joined the movement and declared themselves Stigma Free Zones.

Michele Hart Loughlin, Program Coordinator at the Bergen CountyDivision of Mental Health Services has created a helpful resource. Her Stigma FreeToolkit provides a sample resolution so joining is easyfor all who want to make their town a Stigma Free Zone. A list of the 26 towns still needing Ambassadors to approach their town council to ask them to pass SFZ resolutions is at the end of the newsletter.

# SFZ NEWS PUBLISHES FIRST EDITION

The Stigma Free Zone News of NJ aims toprovide a forum for supporters to read about SFZ newsand upcoming events. Our mission is "To spread good news about mentalhealth and provide a neutral space to talk about stigma and mental illness issues".

It is the brainchild of Demarest SFZAmbassador, Cynthia Chazen, who acts as editor. "The SFZ has grown so large, one town doesn't know what the other is doing", she said. "With churches, rotaries and schools now joining, we need a place to not onlyshare news, but talk about mental health and the related issues that affectevery person in Bergen County. Mental health is a huge issue nationally and globally, but we aren't organized enough yet to truly collaborate on the local level. *Improving mental healthcare is everyone's responsibility*. We need to know each other better".

Chazen has been with the SFZ since 2013. Under her leadership Paramus church, Central Unitarian, won the 2016 NJ Governor's Award for Fighting Stigma. They recently hosted over 100 people at a round table on the role of faith communities in mental illness outreach.

She speaks regularly on various mental health-related issues.

Chazen hopes to form a county-wide SFZ Task Force to serve as a think tank on Bergen's mental health needs and involve more local healthcare organizations in Stigma Free, including our hospitals. She dreams of a regional pediatric psych ER and establishing dubhouses and first episode psychosis treatment programs in every NJ county.

Since the newsletter isn't affiliated with government orany town, every NJ voice concerned about mental health can be heard. Chazen invites citizens and all SFZ towns, Ambassadors and mental health - related organizations and groups to submit news, opinions and event announcements for inclusion in the newsletter.

She envisions a place for all people to socialize apart from mood-altering substances, and hopes the café can also house a space for events that fight addiction stigmaand promote mental healing. 

Former NJ G overnor Richard Codeyvisited Ramapo College of New Jersey in Mahwah on September 28, 2016 to declare thecampus Stigma Free. They celebrated student efforts to educate themselves, faculty and administrators about mental illness. G overnor Codey and his wife, Mary Jo, established the Codey Fund for Mental Health to ensure that compassionate, quality mental healthcare is universally accessible and that the stigmaassociated with mental illness is overcome through public awareness and education.

Ramapo College is the 4th college in the state to declare a Stigma Free Zone status, following Montclair State University, Stevens Institute of Technology and Caldwell University. Ramapo College students are quite active in volunteerism.
